

## The Broughton Pickwick Club

14 Jan 1918

The 176th Meeting of the Club was held at Headquarters The Broughton Hotel, Gt. Cheetham St. East, on Monday January 14<sup>th</sup>, Mr Lowton occupying the Chair - he was supported by Mr Pickwick, Bob Sawyer, Magnus, Bantam, Jingle, Sam Weller, Joe the fat boy, Winkle, Perker, Smiggers, Trundle, Mr Pott and last but by no means least the Club's favourite "Job Trotter" who made his first appearance in the Club Room since joining the Colours, he was accorded a rousing welcome, and looked exceptionally fit and well in the "Kilts" of the Seaforth Highlanders.

The evening being an open night for Members and Friends, Mr Lowton opened the meeting by extending a hearty welcome to the visitors: Messrs O'Connor, Dawson, Platt, Riley, Higgins, Councillor Whittle, Leeming, Pte Dixon and Mr Morley.

Mr Winkle opened the Musical Programme with a pianoforte selection of popular melodies, followed by the King of Songsters "Perker" who gave "When you come home" in his usual pleasing manner. Sam Weller "Tha' mun 'ear all", Job Trotter Pianeforte selection, "Raymond" Jingle "Friend O' Mine and Absent", Mr Morley (a visitor) "Dance for your Uncle Joe" and "Ha Ha Ha" both items being deservedly applauded.

The absent members toast, the Army & Navy, was hereabouts taken to the singing of "Auld Lang Syne". Bob Sawyer delighted everybody with his favourite "Jolly Good Company". Whittle in seconding Mr O'Connor's remarks made a very able speech in which he expressed his high appreciation of the spirit of good fellowship by which the Members were actuated and which was reflected in the array of talent they had provided for their guests - this was his first appearance in the Broughton Pickwick Club and he felt sure he voiced the feelings of the whole of the visitors when he said "they all hoped to come again". Alfred Jingle proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the Chairman which was ably seconded by Bob Sawyer. The Chairman suitably responding.
