

## Minutes of the 1262<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the Manchester Pickwick Club held at the Moorside Social Club on 16<sup>th</sup> March, 2022

The 1262<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the Manchester Pickwick Club was unusual in a number of respects; firstly, the regular minute writer was unavoidably absent and the notes for the meeting had to be taken by Tom Roker, one of the few Pickwickians able to do joined up writing, but more of that later. Secondly, it was noted that the top table inhabitants were drinking tea rather than their usual intake but no reason for that has appeared.

The meeting started exactly on time at 8.00p.m. with the toast to Mr Pickwick, after which it was necessary to appoint a vice chairman for the evening and the person chosen was Solomon Pell after his excellent performance at the last meeting.

There being no guests present it was decided that members should introduce their own characters and it was surprising how well most of them did, one exception was Stiggins who had meticulously prepared a written summary of his character but had forgotten his reading glasses; Grummer's attempt to assist was rebuffed.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by Tom Roker who was also preparing the notes for the 1262<sup>nd</sup> meeting in the previously reported absence of Mivins and here it is necessary to explain that Roker sent a copy of his notes to Mivins so these minutes could be prepared. Good neet owd friends was sung as badly as usual and was followed by an equally unmusical rendition of the National Anthem.

The raffle raised £3.50 whilst the fines box contained £5.50.
