

## Minutes of the 1238<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Manchester Pickwick Club held at the Moorside Social Club on 16th November, 2016

The 1238<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Manchester Pickwick Club was only 2 minutes late in starting due to the new Mr Pickwick's efforts to start on time. On this occasion there was a guest present, Bob Grice, who was introduced by Pickwick himself.

Dodson agreed to act as P.O.C whilst Magnus accepted the role of P.O.R & I.
